24th Sunday (A)

Children who arrive at 8.55am will be marked LATE. Those children who arrive once registration is closed will be marked as U which is late after registration closes and this will affect their attendance percentage.

On Tuesday, Year 6 had the opportunity to go and see the Tall Ships Festival and witnessed the ships sailing down the Thames in the 'Parade of Sail'. We were all very excited to see such a wonderful sight. Each ship had at least one flag and reminded us of the ship in the film 'Pirates of the Caribbean'. Some of the ships were very tall whilst others were tiny in comparison. We waved and cheered to the crew of the ships and they waved back. We saw at least 50 ships and each one looked majestic sailing towards us in the glorious sunshine with the sails billowing in the gentle breeze. It was truly wonderful and a joy to see. The ships were sailing back to Falmouth. This was London's first regatta for 25 years and the first time a Tall Ships race has both started and finished in a UK port.
