<p>Sin and Examination of Conscience</p> <p><i>Sin is anything you choose to do or not to do that spoils or breaks the friendship with God and with other people. Science –
Leaves

A lobe is a slightly rounded section of a leaf

This leaf has lobes

This leaf does not have lobes.

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A main vein is a vein which has other veins coming off it.

This leaf has one main vein down the middle, with side veins

This leaf has several main veins, running out to each lobe.

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Jagged edges to a leaf like this are called teeth.

Sharp, pointy edges are called prickles.

This leaf is split into smaller 'leaflets'.





Melting Ice Caps

Rising Sea Levels

Carbon and other gases that trap the heat from the sun in the atmosphere.

Too much rain can cause an area to fill up with water.

Changes to the weather including drought, flooding, and storms.

The melting ice means that the sea is getting higher and may flood land near the coast.

Very powerful storms with strong winds.

Not enough rain leads to water shortages and makes it hard to grow food.

Temperatures across the world are getting higher.

The ice at the North and South Poles is melting because the Earth is getting warmer.

DT – Biscuits

Ingredients (makes 12)

- 100g unsalted butter, softened
- 100g golden caster sugar
- 1 small egg
- ½ tsp vanilla extract
- 200g plain flour, plus extra for dusting

1. Pre-heat oven to 200C/180C fan/gas 6 and line a baking sheet with baking parchment. Put the softened butter in a bowl and beat it with electric beaters until soft and creamy. Beat in the sugar, then the egg and vanilla, and finally the flour to make a dough. If the dough feels a bit sticky, add a little bit more flour and knead it in.

2. Pull pieces off the dough and roll them out to about ½ cm thick on a floured surface. If you don't have a roller gently flatten them with your hands. Or use the side of a tall glass,

3. Transfer the individual biscuits to the baking sheet and bake for 8-10 mins or until the edges are just brown. You will need to keep an eye on them to make sure that they are not in the oven for too long.

4. Leave to cool for 5 mins, then serve. Will keep for three days in a biscuit tin.
